About the Director

Keith Fitch currently holds the Vincent K. and Edith H. Smith Chair in Composition at CIM, where he heads the composition department and also directs the CIM New Music Ensemble. His works have been performed throughout the U.S., Europe, and Japan by such ensembles as The Philadelphia Orchestra, the American Composers Orchestra, the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center, the Cleveland Chamber Symphony, the St. Luke's Chamber Ensemble and the Da Capo Chamber Players, among many others. Additionally, his music has been heard at the Norfolk Chamber Music Festival, the June in Buffalo Festival, the Midwest Composers' Symposium, the Atlantic Center for the Arts, Milwaukee PremiereFest, New York's Carnegie and Merkin Halls and in university settings nationwide. His most recent work, 'Tho Night Be Falling (commission, Fromm Music Foundation), was premiered by the Colorado String Quartet in June 2009 at the Soundfest Chamber Music Festival. Upcoming projects include a work celebrating the fortieth anniversary of the Da Capo Chamber Players and a solo work for the celebrated violinist, Lina Bahn. A native of Indiana, he began composing at age eight and began formal musical training on the double bass at age eleven. He attended the Indiana University School of Music, where he completed his Doctorate in 1995. At Indiana, he studied composition with Frederick Fox, Eugene O'Brien and Claude Baker, double bass with Bruce Bransby and Murray Grodner, and chamber music with Rostislav Dubinsky, founder of the Borodin Quartet. He also counts Donald Erb and Joan Tower among his compositional mentors. Among his many awards are the annual Dean's Prize for Composition at Indiana (six times), the Kate and Cole Porter Memorial Fellowship at Indiana, three ASCAP Young Composer Awards, three National Society of Arts and Letters awards, an Individual Artist Grant from the Indiana Arts Commission and the National Endowment for the Arts, and, most recently, a Fromm Foundation Commission. He has enjoyed multiple residencies at The MacDowell Colony and the Virginia Center for the Creative Arts, as well as at The Charles Ives Center for American Music, and the Atlantic Center for the Arts, and he has twice served as Resident Composer and faculty at the Chamber Music Conference and Composers' Forum of the East. He has taught at Indiana University, Bard College, and for eleven years served on the faculty of the Mannes College of Music in New York, where he founded the new music ensemble, CIRCE. His music is published by Non Sequitur Music and Lauren Keiser Music, Inc.

Inscape

Inscape (2010) is an exploration of the expressive capacities of the unaccompanied violin. Through the course of the work, the initial slow melodic phrases

gradually morph into fast, angular music. As the fast music reaches its climax, it is pulled back to the initial slow tempo and the piece begins dies away in a less distinct, ethereal atmosphere. The piece gets its title from a word initially used by Gerard Manley Hopkins, defined as the unique inner nature of a person or object, as shown in a work of art. *Inscape* is dedicated to my friend, violinist Esther McMahon. Special thanks to Anthony Charles Bracewell for his invaluable assistance in the composition process.

About the Composers

Composer Louis Chiappetta is currently pursuing his BM at CIM, where he studies with his long time mentor, Keith Fitch. He began his formal composition studies at age thirteen at the Mannes College of Music in New York. Chiappetta has participated in master classes with Derek Bermel, Christopher Rouse, John Corigliano, Lukas Ligeti, Tania Leon, Syd Hodkinson, Paul Moravec, Peter Lieberson and George Tsontakis. In 2009 he was accepted to the Aspen Music Festival and School's Individual Composition Studies course, where he studied with George Tsontakis. Some Remember, Some Dream was written for the Aspen Contemporary Ensemble and was premiered by them this past August.

Jesse Limbacher was born in 1991 in historic Williamsburg, Virginia and was raised in the Richmond metropolitan area. There, he attended the prestigious Appomattox Regional Governor's School for the Arts and Technology (ARGS). While at ARGS, he collaborated with the schools theatre department in crafting a new score of incidental music for Shakespeare's *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, as well as composing a piano concerto for the ARGS orchestra. Limbacher also served as conductor for both of these engagements. While in high school, he took extensive private lessons with numerous local teachers in the fields of classical guitar, piano, violin, composition, theory and conducting. He is a freshman at CIM, studying composition with Keith Fitch.

Tyler Mains is an American composer/experimental electronic performing artist. His methods of creation are often low-tech and involve the use of Max/MSP and contact microphones to produce electro-acoustic soundscapes in a live environment. He grew up in Kentucky, studying violin through high school. Composition became a primary interest during early high school and electronic improvisation soon followed. Mr. Mains attended CIM's Young Composer Program in 2007 and 2008 and currently is a freshman at the Institute, studying composition with Keith Fitch.

Fabio Pires was born in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. He started piano at the Rio de Janeiro Conservatory of Music after playing the violin for two years. In 2004,

he moved from Brazil to the United States, where he continued his piano studies with Michael Adcock (piano) and Alejandro Hernandez-Valdez (composition) at the Washington Conservatory of Music. Currently a freshman at CIM, Mr. Pires is a piano performance student of Kathryn Brown and a composition student of Keith Fitch.

Joshua Rodriguez, born in Cordoba, Argentina, spent his childhood in Guatemala and Mexico surrounded by Latin American music. After completing a BA in Music through Thomas Edison State College and the Verity Institute, studying with Dr. M. Dean Kincaid, he returned to Mexico to teach music in a private school and to further develop his compositional skills with Myrna Bazán. He is a graduate student at CIM studying with Keith Fitch and Steven Mark Kohn. His music spans various genres including sacred and secular vocal music, classical ensemble music, contemporary pop songs and recently electronic music. In the future, he hopes to apply his skills to concert music and film scoring as well as teaching.

James Rubino attends CIM as a composition major studying with Keith Fitch.
